
Those 'Awe' inspiring moments in life

Beautiful Children of God;

Have you ever heard someone indifferently say "I guess all we can do is pray"? I must confess, I have heard myself say this in moments of uncertainty. Why do Christians often act as though entering the throne room of our Almighty God is some kind of last-ditch effort when we've run out of logical options? I think it speaks to a higher question that burns within us: does prayer really work?

In Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians, he tells them: "Never stop praying. Be thankful in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you who belong to Christ Jesus". If prayer is what we quickly mutter before a meal, or something only done while folding our hands and closing our eyes before bed, then Paul's directive is impossible to implement. Prayer is more. I like how Dan Allender puts it in his book *To Be Told*. He defines prayer as a *"posture of dialogue that expects God to speak in the mix of our conversation... God wants us to negotiate with him regarding our future story. But to even consider doing this is absurd. God is God: Almighty, Creator, Sovereign. We are marred humans: flawed, sinful, sometimes too stupid for words. How can we negotiate with the Divine? The negotiations begin when we start taking him at his word."*

This week, while reading through Mark's account of Jesus calming the storm, the disciples' words held new meaning for me. They may not have seen it as such, but they were praying when they shook Jesus awake and in desperation yelled, "Don't you care if we drown?"

I feel like that right now concerning our youth. I am grabbing hold of Jesus and yelling, "Don't you care if [they] drown?" As feelings of isolation, anxiety, depression, and fear for the future overwhelm our youth, will you stand with me to fast and pray? Will you be like the persistent neighbour that Jesus teaches us about in Luke 11– asking, seeking and knocking until the situation changes? What remarkable audacity, and yet it's Jesus' very teaching! We must take Him at His word if we desire our prayer lives to take on passion and substance.

For the next five Mondays I will be fasting from food and hosting a Zoom call at 7pm Eastern Time. This Zoom call will have one purpose–pray for the youth of Stratford and beyond. Will you join me? We will not be alone in this; all across Canada, YFC is fasting and praying on Mondays as we communally seek the wisdom of God in this highly divisive time. "I never thought I'd be here." How many of you have thought that in the last year, or at any point in your lives? I know I have. It's so easy to feel overwhelmed and tired, especially when our lives aren't going the way we hoped they would!

"...but in your hearts honour Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you..." 1 Peter 3:15

We are called to live in such a way that people are compelled to ask us why we have hope. Now, I'll be the first to admit that I'm probably not exuding quite that much hope these days. Why is it that I'm having a hard time exemplifying hope to those around me by my words and actions? It probably has something to do with how the last year has played out, but it also has to do with my heart, and God is certainly working on this area of my life right now.

We have hope because God has made it clear throughout all of time that he has plans for good, no matter what is happening around us. Even if people aren't constantly asking me why I have hope, I have an answer ready: God has shown me that he is good, even when I'm not sure how he will work things out in the end.

This hope is the message that we share with our students by inviting them into a life of hope in Jesus, and we walk with them as they discover what it looks like to live out that hope. Right now, things look different than what we usually do, but it is a privilege to be part of teenagers' lives!

As we are able (depending on lockdown restrictions), we have been hosting movie night events, where we teach students how to identify themes in the media they consume. We were also able to host a virtual "Florida Trip" over spring break, and both of these programs have led to some wonderful conversations about faith with our youth!

I've also discovered that a lot of teens who I know work at the grocery store closest to our new home. It is so wonderful to see them in an "unofficial" capacity and ask how they are doing - even in brief conversation, you can learn a lot about these awesome kids and offer encouragement!

I have the continued privilege of serving in our head office, and I will be spending one day a week assisting Southwestern Ontario staff with social media initiatives long-term. Plus, I'm nearly done the credentialing process, which has been an amazing way to draw closer to God while learning more about him and his word!
